News & Views



We are in the Easter season, the 50 days following resurrection day. We remember the resurrection of Jesus, his taking on death and giving new life. Even as we remember Jesus' death and resurrection, our experiences continue. This year my mother's death was on Easter Monday. This is the first day of the week of

the Easter season. My mother, Grace Fowler, was in her nineties and seemed reasonably healthy though declining in recent months. So the call I received was a surprise – yet not totally unexpected. Perhaps that is the way we think of mortality – a surprising aspect of life, but one we really know is a reality.

Certainly, my sisters and I have started our grieving processes. That is plural because we each have our own set of memories and our own complex relationship with our mother. We each feel the loss, though each of us will work through it a bit differently. I know that for me, both my faith and my mother's make a difference. We opined in the obituary that "Grace taught us all to walk in the light and grace of God." We have received emails that suggest we were not the only ones that saw things this way. We also saw our mother's humanity, and that while dedicated to her life of faith, the life in the world sometimes led her to her own struggles as well.

Yet, isn't this the way of life? None of us are perfect, and all are susceptible to the vicissitudes of life. We all are in need of the grace of God – including my mother, Grace. I don't expect that she should have been perfect nor more than human. What I did see was one who tried to love her children and, as well as she could, all God's children. She paid attention to what it meant to be faithful and it showed.

That is one reason that, though I am sad she is no longer in my life, I do have a confidence that she is in the hands of God and I find solace in that confidence. At the same, time I believe those of us still inhabiting the earth are also in the hands of God. Perhaps in a different way, but no less real. We have been given the hope we know in Christ's resurrection – that death does not have the final say.

2 Corinthians 4:16-18 So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.

These verses invite us to become aware of God at work in our lives, renewing us in the face of all the uncertainties and struggles. My daughter, Jessa, and her husband, Chris, just bought their first home. It is a 1903 farmhouse. A well-built house, yet it has not been updated in many years. So, they are in the process of doing some renovations, most of which are to the interior of the house. This term *renew* is also described as *renovate* in the Greek dictionary. Thinking about how they are renovating and thinking about how God offers to renovate my life invites me to accept that God also can do some updating of my spiritual life, my relationship with God through the resurrection of the Son.

I see the work my daughter and son-in-law are putting into their house and think about the work the Holy Spirit puts into renewing and renovating our relationship with God. Death is perhaps the ultimate renovation – the eternal life beyond our earthly experience. So, my mother experiences the eternal weight of glory and those of us still living here are invited to open our lives to continued renewal of our inner nature, that God might align us with what is eternal. Then Paul continues in 2 Corinthians chapter 5:16-21:

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So, we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

May we live into the resurrection and become the righteousness of God by grace through faith.


Lael Retreat Center Update
